6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

- 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System
 - We have integrated Mission and Vision into our decision making process thus fostering effective leadership in tune with vision mission and enhancing positive relationships with all personnel. We encourage and celebrate achievements that support our Mission and Vision.
 - The Vidyapeeth has hierarchy to ensure its management system, development, implementation and continuous improvement. It has established various academic and administrative bodies which are decision making bodies for all the Vidyapeeth activities.
 - The Board of Management designs and executes short term and long term plans by integrating departmental plans.
 - The Vidyapeeth has internal audit mechanism where all the income and expenditure is audited annually. Further the audited balance-sheet is submitted to Board of Management for necessary approval. The copies of audited balance-sheet are submitted to UGC, Govt. of Maharashtra and other statutory authorities.
- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The Vidyapeeth has a prime focus on having the globally acceptable curricula. Being a "Deemed to be University", the Vidyapeeth has flexibility in designing its own curriculum.

As per UGC rules, syllabus revision is carried out every three years through proper channel viz IQAC, BoS, AC & BoM. New trends in the field technology, Health sector, Hotel Management, Management are introduced to strengthen the curriculum that can provide deep & practical knowledge to the students.

Syllabus revision of departments under purview of various Councils, is carried out as per council directives. Employability and student progress is the prime focus of the vidyapeeth. Vidyapeeth offers new programmes to match the current trends.

New Masters Program in yoga has been introduced by department of Ayurveda as Yoga is globally accepted science. There is a worldwide need for well trained professionals to spread this ancient Indian science across the globe.

As per UGC directives TMV has implemented CBCS system wherever applicable. Vidyapeeth conducts undergraduate, Post graduate & Doctoral programmes in various fields. For UG & PG courses CBCS is implemented for all programs except the programs under the purview of Councils.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The Teaching learning process is developed to ensure effective delivery of all contents in curricula in the prescribed format and to bridge the curriculum gaps necessary contents are covered beyond curriculum.

Bridge Courses inducts the fresher's into the collegiate atmosphere, familiarizes them with the vision, mission, goals, objectives, rules, regulations of the Vidyapeeth and bridges the gap.

The continuous assessment through assignments, tutorial, class tests and quiz enables the teachers to identify the advanced and the slow learners. Advanced learners can opt for self-study courses, challenging assignments etc., and slow learners are given remedial coaching. The course teachers and the mentors free the students from their inhibitions, if any and pay special attention to their studies through coaching and peer learning. The student-centric methods followed in teaching and learning process ensure interactive, participative and experiential learning in academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

The Vidyapeeth has defined program wise and course wise learning outcome. These benchmarks are displayed on the website and Objectives/Outcomes (Pos), Course Outcomes (COs) for overall development of students is communicated to teachers and students. Learning outcomes stand as a testimony to the teaching, learning and evaluation process.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The Vidyapeeth intensively promotes Research and Development and also extends financial, administrative support for research activities of its faculty. Many of the post graduate departments have received funds from the UGC/ICSSR and other Government funding agencies to carry out major and minor research projects. The Vidyapeeth is prompt in financially supporting a well designed and practical research proposal. A unique feature of the Vidyapeeth is inter-disciplinary research which has created synergy between various disciplines.

Vidyapeeth encourages participation and organizing of *Academic Events*. The Vidyapeeth follows *UGC regulations* and directions vis-à-vis the M. Phil. and doctoral research. There exists an Ethical committee/Review and Research committee/Ph.D. course work committee at the departmental / faculty level that continuously monitors and facilitates research activities of students. The Vidyapeeth ensures that the thesis submitted for a doctoral degree is *plagiarism* compliant before it is finally sent for review by external referees. All doctoral theses are finally submitted to the UGC whereby they are added to the **Shodhganga network**. Many of our internal funded projects have received *patents and copyrights*.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Central library is covering 1040 sq.mts. area and is located on ground as well as first floor of A Wing. Accession of the books is easily possible on the ground floor and first floor serves as reading room with capacity of 150 students. Remote access to e-resources of library is available. All the manuscripts are available in CD form which is approximately 1300 in number. Information regarding all the CDs is listed on Vidyapeeth website

Infrastructure

In order to promote good teaching learning environment Vidyapeeth has provided the necessary learning resources to the academic departments. Computer facility is provided to all the teaching and non-teaching staff. Special lectures of the resource persons from the industries and academics are conducted in A/V room. The A/V room is also used for research students' presentation, either for their M.Phil. or Ph.D. work.

Recreation hall for students and Yoga hall is constructed.

Vidyapeeth has processed the request to improve the speed to 35 mbps to the service provider and will be done from next month.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Vidyapeeth strongly believes that the human resource is its most important asset.

To forecast the human resource needs and to recruit the right and qualified personnel, Vidyapeeth has a well defined, effective and merit based selection and recruitment mechanism.

Through proper technical, academic and soft skills training from time to time, Vidyapeeth ensures that their staff is fully equipped to take the challenges of the respective roles.

The Vidyapeeth has recognized significance of motivation and hence strictly adheres to systematic performance appraisal systems and promotion policies for teaching and non teaching staff. It also gives incentives from time to time as the case may be.

The Vidyapeeth has its service rules. The salary is disbursed through the bank accounts on a stipulated date without fail. Staff welfares schemes such as P.F., Gratuity, medical insurance schemes, Employee's Co-operative Credit Society, canteen facility, Staff Quarters are in place. The employees are privileged with various types of leaves such as Casual Leave, Earned Leave, Medical Leave, Maternity Leave, vacation to teaching staff, etc.

Faculty Development Programs are conducted regularly. The Vidyapeeth also encourages its faculty to participate in Orientation Courses, Refresher Courses, Short Term Courses that helps the faculty to sharpen their teaching skills. Career Advancement Scheme is also made available to the Teaching Faculty. The Teaching and Non Teaching staff is encouraged to

peruse their further studies, if they wish to, by providing fees remission and time concessions.

The University has sufficient number of tie ups with industries and universities for staff and students. It also helps the students for Career Planning and Employability.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty and staff recruitment needs are identified and the same is reported to the management by heads of the departments. Especially, faculty recruitment proposal is first taken up in Board of studies which for the recommends to academic council and finally with the approval of board of management advertisements for filling various posts is published in local English and Marathi newspapers and also on Vidyapeeth website. Applications received are scrutinized and candidate fulfilling the qualifications are invited for interview. The interview selection committee is formulated as per the UGC norms. The recommendations of selection committee are put forth to Board of Management & the approved candidates are recruited. Similar recruitment procedure is followed for the recruitment of administrative staff.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Industry Institute Interaction Cell is fully functional. It takes initiative for effective interaction between Students and Industry.

Experts from industry are also involved in the form of interaction with staff and students to achieve the necessary employability and Entrepreneur skills.

Most of the students from Physiotherapy and Nursing programs are absorbed by the institutions/ hospitals where they are doing their internship.

Vidyapeeth had applied to charity commissioner office for registration of alumni association. However at the departments constituents units are formed and alumni contributes for the development of the respective departments.

Sanskrit is the pioneer department of the Vidyapeeth. Alumni of this department had financially contributed significantly for the purpose of scholarship for the students of Sanskrit department.

Furthermore alumni of Nursing and Physiotherapy Departments had financially contributed for the development of the department. Law, Ayurved, Indology, Hotel Management and Social Work alumni contributed for the respective departments through non financial way such as conducted guest lectures, donation of books, infrastructural resources, equip the present students for employability skills.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

Few UG departments conduct Parent-Teacher meetings which help in getting feedback from parents. It also helps in knowing student's problems and resolving them.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

Various Development Programmes viz. Spoken English, Internet skills, Training on Administrative procedures, Information on RTI act were conducted for clerical staff.

For Class IV employees informative sessions were conducted on few topics like Discipline, 'Swachhata Abhiyan, Save Water & Electricity, etc.

Vidyapeeth timely extends **financial support to Employees Co-operative Credit Society**.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco friendly

1. Energy conservation -

Vidyapeeth has made remarkable efforts and effectively implemented measures needed to conserve energy, committed to save the environment and working towards a sustainable future.

- The campus lights have been replaced by LED lights to reduce energy consumption; we have replaced and installed remaining around 100 Tube lights and Bulbs which covered the Street way and the Parking area of the Main Campus.
- All rooms are provided with large windows to let sunlight come in and air to circulate.

2. Use of renewable energy –

Use of renewable energy is one of the effective ways of creating a sustainable environment. The college has taken many effective steps in the direction. Some of them are as follows:

• Installation of Solar Plant of 60kw in the campus in addition to existing 40kw

3. Plantation –

In the year 2016-17, Vidyapeeth Planted many new trees along with the herb garden and raised garden on the campus.

4. Wet Garbage Disposal –

Daily wet waste is separated and sent to the composting plant that is functional in the premises for disposing the wet garbage. The wet waste generated at the hostel unit is recycled and the manure created from it is utilized for rose garden. To improve this facility Vidyapeeth planned the following initiative in this year. Compost pit is installed near canteen which helps in disposal of wet garbage and generation of excellent quality fertilisers.

Initiative Planned:

• Vidyapeeth going to purchase Waste compost Machine. The compost machine is environment friendly, which will compost kitchen waste (Pre-cooking Vegetables Cuts) and garden waste (Lawns cut grass) approximately 2.5 kgs

5. Water harvesting –

Rain water harvesting is being used as one measure of conservation to increase the quality and volume of water in the bore well. The rain water is channelized towards bore wells to raise the ground water level. Vidyapeeth owns a pond in the garden adjacent to the campus and it serves a reservoir for watering the plants and trees in the entire garden specially during summers.

Initiative Planned:

• To set up the water recycling unit in the college and girls hostel

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

Title: TMV is conducting a Free Heritage walk to inculcate National Values and awareness of Indian Culture and Heritage in the society.

Objectives:

- 1. To create awareness among community about our rich heritage
- 2. To inculcate moral values among the students and help in building a good character of the citizens.

The context

It is a well known fact that there are many historical places in Pune but the people at large are not aware of them. Numerous sites with great historical and cultural values are in the city. However the local people are not aware of them. Therefore the idea of conducting Heritage walk with an expert by involving the local community came in.

Practice:

Since November 2015, the heritage walks and site visits have been conducted twice a month with the help of faculty members of Shri Balmukund Lohia Centre of Sanskrit & Indological Studies and other experts of the heritage site in collaboration with Maharashtra Times (a Marathi newspaper of the Times group) as a media partner for publicity. Heritage India Communication Pvt. Ltd. has been the sponsorer.

Evidence of Success:

- 1. Every walk is attended by average 80 to 100 people as the event is publicised in the newspaper before and after the actual event.
- 2. After participating in these walks many people are motivated and have developed interest in this field. They have started taking formal education related to this subject especially the course related to Indology run by the TMV.
- **3.** After participating in these walks and getting the relevant information, many people have started conducting their own heritage walks for customised groups and thereby are getting employment.

In this regards IQAC conducted an awareness programme for teaching staff on copyrights. The programme was very informative and well appreciated by faculty members.

Practice:

- The IQAC strives to conduct seminars and workshops for all faculty members regarding patents and copyrights. Vidyapeeth has appointed a consultant to facilitate filing of copyrights.
- Faculty members are motivated to write and publish their papers, books, etc.

Evidence of Success:

• 13 Copyrights were filed and out of which three have been received.

Best Practice 2:

<u>Title of the Practice</u>: Non Drug Therapy

Objective:

- 1. To encourage non drug therapy research
- 2. To enlighten "Mantrachikitsa" the endangered treasure of ancient Indian Science.
- 3. To avoid side effects of medicine.

<u>Context</u>: Vedic science describes Mantrachikitsa in treating various disorders. This treasure is in danger of extinction because of lack of scientific approach. Department of Ayurveda of the Vidyapeeth focuses on this aspect of No Drug Therapy in a systematic manner.

Practice:

- The Department of Ayurveda conducts regular experiments on various patients to evaluate the effect of chanting of various Mantras in a specific manner.
- Monitoring the patients and keeping record of the findings.
- The Department of Ayurveda conducts research on Non Drug Therapy in the form of Mantrachikitsa.

Evidence of Success:

• 3 research projects are completed so far by the faculty and Ph.D. Scholars of the Department and 3 projects are in progress out of which one is funded by AYUSH MINISTRY, Govt. of India.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

Usage of Solar Energy: Almost 20% of the total lighting power required is generated using non-renewable means like Solar panels in house. This saved electricity & cost effective.

Following green practices: The Vidyapeeth has a green campus with lot of plantation around the building. As per custom and tradition prevalent at the college we distribute saplings to guests, invitees and dignitaries.

Tree Plantation: Under 4 crores tree plantation programme of Government of Maharashtra, Tilak MaharashtraVidyapeeth's Department of Law and Hotel Management planted 1000 trees at Katraj Survey no: 21

Promoting Green Practices: The students of Management and Commerce work towards making A Green Campus where environmental friendly practices and education combine to promote sustainable and eco-friendly practices in the campus.
