About Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeeth:

As per the directions given by Mahatma Gandhi during the Indian National Congress session held at Nagpur in 1920, Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeeth was established in 1921, as an educational memorial of Lokmanya Bal Gangadhar Tilak, "The father of the Indian Unrest" and an advocate of National Education. The establishment with the Vidyapeeth was aimed towards imparting National Education conceived by Lokmanya Tilak in his four-fold formula.

TMV was awarded 'Deemed University' status by Government of India in 1987 in recognition of its significant contribution in the field of education. During the last 25 years, the Vidyapeeth has developed significantly. Eventually the new faculties were formed in the field of Computer Science, management, Education, Engineering, Health Science, Law and Social work. Today, the TMV offers various courses through 12 Boards of Studies and having 27 departments.

TMV has achieved tremendous progress through quantitative expansion and qualitative improvements on various academic fronts. TMV is committed to maximize the knowledge and skills of students, thus making them competent. The ethics of value-added education system are strictly followed in the TMV to promote good character building among the young generation.

About Department of Social Work:

- In 2005-06, the department launched two years' post graduate program, i.e. MSW, in which students are imparted knowledge about social work through 12 papers in each year.
- Since year 2006-07, two specializations namely Family & Child Welfare (FCW) and Urban and Rural Community Development (URCD) are on offer. Hence students opt for either of the specializations which involve community based field work and then each student prepares a project report.

Department of Social Work was started with the aim of making constant efforts to impart to our students not only qualitative but also updated inputs, relevant for their theory-field knowledge, skills, attitude, and professional and personality development. Presently the department has developed a tie-up with Police Department in Pune wherein students get an opportunity to work with Local Police Stations especially on issues related to domestic violence and juvenile delinquency. Recently the department has also formed collaboration with Yerawada Central Prison. This has helped the second year students to actually do field work with the prison inmates and carry on

counseling work for them. The department of Social Work has 6 qualified faculty members. For last three years, department had organized three National level conferences on key issues of society, such as, 'Social Exclusion: Perspectives and Challenges', 'Women in Contemporary India: Perspectives and Challenges' and 'NT, DNT and VJNT communities in India: Present situation and future paradigms.' Even department has successfully conducted three 'Six days research Methodology Workshop' for M. Phil. and Ph. D. scholars' and one 'Capacity Building Training program for Ph.D. Guide' supported by Western Regional Centre, Indian Council of Social Science Research, Mumbai. Recently, department has also organized 'One day Training program on Human Rights' for MSW students from Western Maharashtra supported by National Human Rights Commission, New Delhi.

Rationale

Ageing is a natural inevitable cycle of change in life. Ageing in India is exponentially increasing due to the impressive gains that society has made in terms of increased life expectancy. Population ageing is an important determinant of economic development. India's older population will increase dramatically over the next four decades. The share of India's population ages 60 and older is projected to climb from 8 percent in 2010 to 19 percent in 2050, according to the United Nations Population Division (UN 2011). This profound shift in the share of older Indians—taking place in the context of changing family relationships and severely limited old-age income support—brings with it a variety of social, economic, and health care policy challenges. The population dynamics fueling India's growth and changing age structure are rooted in the combined impact of increasing life expectancy and declining fertility.

Due to the changes in the family structure and the value system, the respect, honor, status and authority, which the elderly used to enjoy in the traditional society, gradually has started declining and in the process the elderly are relegated to an insignificant place in our society. Rising numbers of older people will put new and increasing demands on the health care system. Though health services are available in urban areas, high cost in getting them makes it difficult to utilize them. In rural areas, neither the facilities nor financial support is available. The longevity of life, if not planned well for retirement, could imply a high fiscal burden for the government on account of providing for healthcare of the elderly in the absence of proper insurance and inefficient public healthcare system.

Specific problems of the economically dependent aged were: lack of respect, loneliness, financial difficulties and inability to find a suitable job. Nearly 90 percent of the total workforces are employed in the unorganized sector. They retire without any financial security like pension and other post retirement benefits.

Most likely victim of elder abuse is a female of very advanced age, role-less, functionally impaired, lonely and living at home with some one primarily their adult child, spouse or other relatives. A dependent elderly with physical or mental impairments may be perceived as a burden by the caregivers and resulting stressful situation may most likely lead to the abuse and neglect of the aged person. Cycle of abuse or inter-generational transmission of violence, dependence because of impairments, intra-individual dynamics, stress, negative attitudes towards the elderly and social-isolation are some forms of abuse.

This is the awaken call for social work professionals to discuss and come out with some of the intervention strategies. In this context, Tilak Maharashtra Vidyapeeth, Department of Social Work is organizing one day National Conference to highlight situation and issues of ageing and discuss the strategies and core areas of intervention to tackle the problems of older people and to make endeavor for the inclusion of aged by making the gathering of field practitioners, academicians and research scholars. This National Conference will be helpful to prepare consolidated and well defined strategic plans with networking on activities and programs to be conducted to encourage 'successful' ageing, 'healthy' ageing, 'productive' ageing and 'active' ageing.
